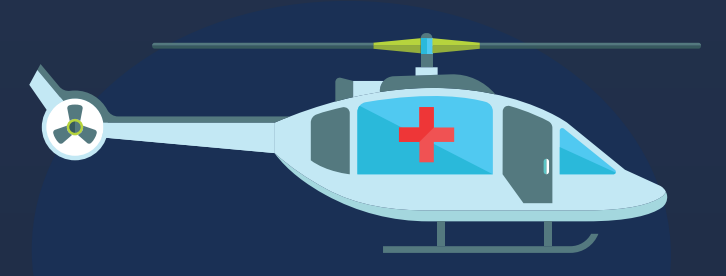


The Road To Surprise Emergency Transportation Bills

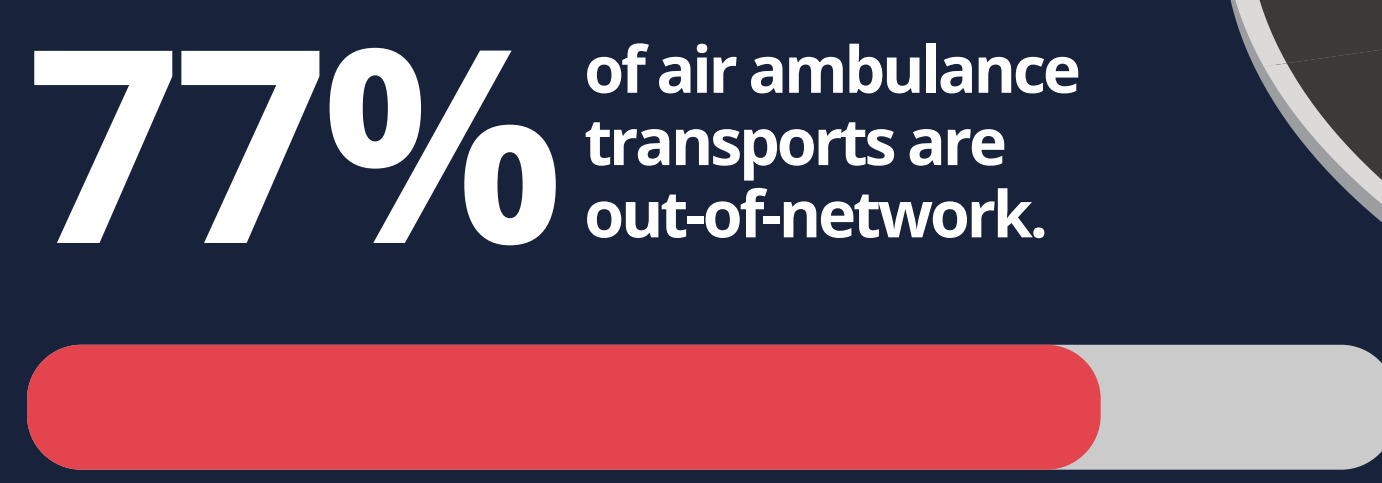
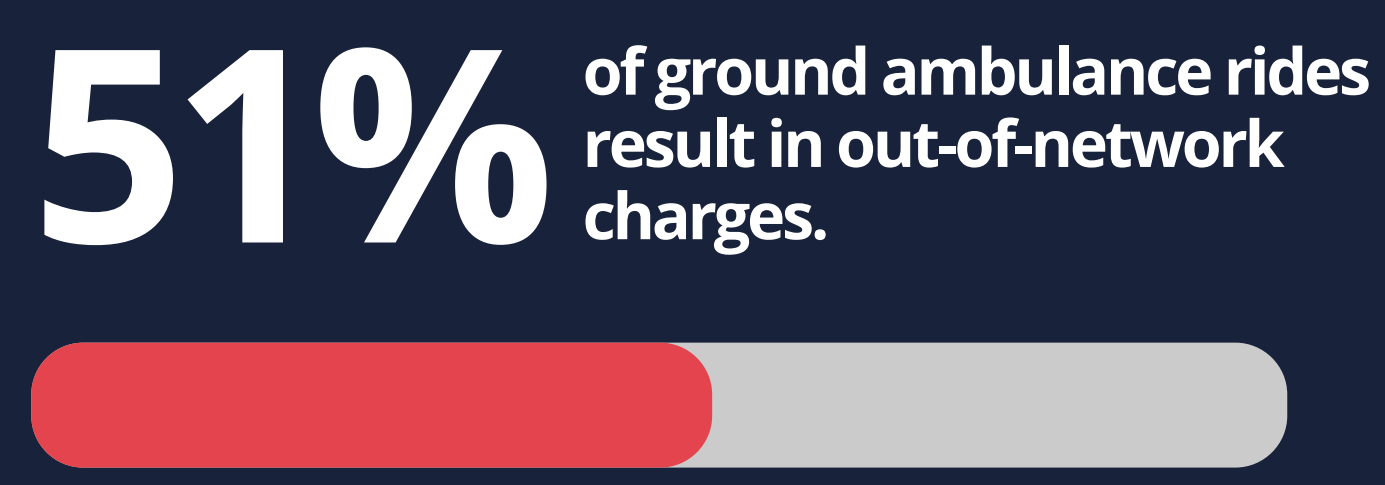
There are an estimated **25 million** emergency room visits per year by ambulance.
