What Happens During a Comprehensive Eye Exam¹

- Vision testing and health screening
- Refraction to determine prescription
- Eye pressure check (for glaucoma)
- Dilated eye exam to view blood vessels and nerves

All Eye Exams Are Not Created Equal¹

Visual Screenings

- Test basic visual acuity and inspect eye and pupils
- Typically conducted by family doctor or school nurse
- Do not require specialized equipment
- Detect reduced vision or eye conditions but do not diagnose

Comprehensive Eye Exams

- Comprehensive examination of eye health, including acuity, refraction, peripheral, and pressure
- Conducted by an optometrist or ophthalmologist
- Use specialized equipment and dilation of eyes
- Diagnose and identify treatment for eye conditions
- Detect serious health conditions, such as hypertension or diabetes
